ACTION & ADVENTURE

WHALE WATCHING: UP CLOSE & VERY PERSONAL!

Tweed operators offer a very different brand of whale watching to what you will find anywhere else along the east coast ... getting up close and very personal in your choice of a 10-man zodiac (inflatable runabout) or an 11-man dive boat. The curious humpbacks regularly pop up right next to the boat – almost within touching distance – and it's a breath-taking experience when some of them ride the gentle swells, heading straight for you. The whale watching season runs uninterrupted from early June to late November, with daily sightings usually fairly close to Cook Island and the shoreline. The 3-4 hour whale watching adventure finishes with a riverside barbeque or brunch at the Sheoak Shack in Fingal– a laid-back surfie-style café featuring shell mobiles and some sling seats made from driftwood and fishing nets.

New Operator! In 2008, the Tweed welcomed a new whale watching operator offering excursions for larger groups in their 45-pax vessel. The new boat still offers the same 'up close and personal' experience where you'll pretty much have the whales all to yourself.

SNORKEL WITH TURTLES & LEOPARD SHARKS

Located approximate 600m offshore from Fingal Head, the Cook Island Aquatic Reserve is one of the best-kept secrets along the east coast – home to a large permanent colony of green and loggerhead turtles, and the docile leopard sharks who visit during the summer months. The abundance of marine life also includes bull rays, spotted eagle rays, giant gropers, wobbiegongs and the occasional grey nurse shark, with rock caves and coral gardens adding to the area's underwater charms. A number of operators take divers out to the reserve, while Fingal Dive Charters and Tweed Snorkelling and Whale Watching Adventures offer regular cruises for snorkellers of all levels.

KAYAKING ON CUDGEN CREEK

Winding through the Tweed Coast wetlands, Cudgen Creek is an important habitat for a wide variety of bird and marine species. The best way to access this wilderness area is on a guided kayak tour where you might also catch a glimpse of the local river dolphins. UNDERWATER BUSHWALKING

This is a walk on the wildside with a difference: A guided scuba dive along the Tweed River. Unlike your regular bushwalk where wildlife sightings are few and fleeting, you'll see marine life in abundance on this scuba safari – dolphins, turtles, rays, octopus, moray eels and fish by the hundreds. This could also be done at night when the underwater inhabitants of the river are even more active and the phosphorus puts on a spectacular light show. This particular operator could also take you out diving with grey nurse sharks off the Tweed Coast out at the “9-mile” where they gather during the winter months. Sightings can't be guaranteed but the sharks are usually there most of the time from mid-July onwards.

A number of operators offer deep sea fishing charters that head out from the Tweed Marina to the offshore reefs in search of billfish, cobia, mackerel, mahi mahi, tuna, pearl perch, snapper, mullaway and parrot fish. UNIQUE TOURS & ATTRACTIONS

CATCH YOUR OWN SEAFOOD PLATTER

Operated by Lee and Robert Eyre of Perfectour (see also [Birds Bay Oyster Farm](#)), Catch-a-Crab Cruises are one of the most popular – and awarded – attractions in the Tweed region.

Daily cruises depart from Birds Bay Oyster Farm on the Tweed River and travel through the small islets and wetlands of the Terranora Inlet, giving passengers the chance to get 'hands on' as the boat stops to feed wild pelicans, pulls up on a sandbar so everyone can have a go at pumping for yabbies and then cruises past the crab pots to haul in the day's catch. An informative presentation on the local spanner and mudcrabs, and some leisurely time dangling the fishing rods over the side complete the three hour cruise.

Returning to the Birds Bay Oyster Farm, passengers can dine on their catch with a succulent crab platter and sample the locally grown oysters. Catch a Crab also run educational cruises for school groups and have won numerous awards, including Tourism NSW's Award of Distinction and have been inducted into Northern Rivers Tourism's Hall of Fame.

CRUISE THROUGH THE RAINFOREST

The only one of its kind in the region, Tweed Endeavour Cruises takes you by boat through the rainforests of Stotts Island and past the Tweed's sprawling canefields to the historic riverport of [Tumbulgum](#).

Stop along the way to feed the wild birds of prey and keep a close eye out for friendly river dolphins as you learn more about the region from Captain Bill's commentary. After browsing

through the art galleries, craft shops and historical country pub at Tumbulgum, you'll enjoy a seafood feast onboard as you travel back to the Tweed.

TROPICAL TREATS

Celebrating its 25th birthday in 2008, Tropical Fruit World and Research Park would have to be the world's healthiest theme park - comprising the largest range of rare and tropical fruit in the world. More than 500 varieties are grown on the 65-hectare plantation, with some of the more quirky varieties including chocolate pudding fruit, lemon meringue pie fruit, chewing gum fruit, champagne fruit and ice-cream bean. It's also a great place to introduce kids to tasty exotics such as jak fruit, babacos, papayas, longans and the giant avocados.

Owner Bob Brinsmead bought the property in 1972, gradually planting out the rolling hills with varieties gathered from all over the world. Prior to this, part of the land was used as by the Department of Agriculture as a research station, where their experimental plot included avocados, lychees, mangoes and macadamia nuts long before most Australians had even heard of these 'new' fruits. It was, in fact, the first place in NSW to grow and market avocados.

Opening to the public in 1973 as Avocadoland, Tropical Fruit World has evolved over the years as a popular family fun park with riverboat cruise, miniature railway, adventure playground and fauna park.

BOTTLE YOUR OWN WINE

You can bottle your own wine at the Tweed's only winery, perched high up in the hills of Carool overlooking the coast. Ilnam Estate Wines produces a boutique range of whites (Chardonnay, Sauvignon Blanc), reds (Shiraz, Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon) and a semi-sweet Rose. They conduct winery and tasting tours on Wednesday and Saturday mornings and operate an alfresco café where you can match their wines with morning tea, lunch or afternoon tea. The café is also famous for its Sunday afternoon sessions, featuring local musicians like Glenn Brace who has performed with the likes of George Benson, Art Garfunkel, Anne Murray and Dionne Warwick. One of the highlight events each year is the 'community harvest', held in late February/early March, when neighbours from far and wide help bring in the crop.

A GETAWAY FOR PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

Jules Lewin and Maggie Wilkins-Russell have renovated and converted an old Queenslander in the centre of Uki into a guesthouse specifically designed for people with a disability. They tell me it is the only one of its kind in Australia – i.e. that has been specifically designed as such, rather than just offering wheelchair accessibility. In addition to ramps, special bathrooms, low tables, wide halls and doorways, etc, they have a solar-powered electronic liftchair so people can get themselves in and out of the pool, Braille and large print signage everywhere, etc. etc. They only opened in December 06 and already have some amazing stories about some of the people who have stayed there – i.e. first holiday some people have had in 15 years, etc. etc.

Jules and Maggie also have interesting backgrounds. Jules has a permanent disability as a result of a crushing injury to her leg several years ago and walks with crutches. Prior to moving to Uki, she was a lecturer in medical science (athophysiology and pharmacology) at Sydney University and has been honoured with Awards for Excellence in both nursing and tertiary education. Maggie was a teacher and principal of a large primary school for many years and has a degree in musicology. For the past 15 years, she has conducted music workshops in Australia and New Zealand and was the director of a number of choirs around Sydney – including the Sydney University Choir, which is how she and Jules met.

FROM THE GARDEN TO THE TABLE

At Mavis Kitchen, you can see how fresh the food is – from your table on the verandah of this beautiful old Queenslander, you look straight out at the salad, veggie and herb garden where they grow their own organic produce for the restaurant.

Depending on what is ripe for the picking each morning, chefs Charlie Ebell and Sandi Allaway design a new blackboard menu every day, highlighting the lush flavours with simple yet elegant country-style recipes.

The house itself has an interesting history: Until very recently, it was one of the Gold Coast's most upmarket restaurants – the Harley Street Brasserie at Labrador. When developers bought the property, owners Peter Clarke and Charlie moved the old Queenslander lock, stock and barrel to their 25-acre hideaway at the base of Mt Warning in the Tweed Valley.

They also offer accommodation in the property's former dairy and an old shed, both of which have been converted into contemporary-style self-contained cabins. Interesting features include a bedroom in what was once the creamery and an open section of roof in the bathroom to create an 'outdoor' shower.

OYSTERS DON'T COME ANY FRESHER THAN THIS!

Commercial oyster farming is an important industry in the Tweed region, with the leases predominantly located along the banks of the Tweed River and in the Terranora Inlet. The local variety is based on the Sydney rock oyster stock but – like wine – the flavour and colour of oysters will vary depending on where they are grown.

A number of co-ops along the highway and Kennedy Drive, west of Tweed Heads, sell locally-grown oysters but Lee and Robert Eyre have taken it one step further by opening their own Oyster Bar where people can come in and sample freshly shucked oysters, either grown locally in their nearby leases when they are harvesting or from suppliers at other times of the year.

At the Birds Bay Oyster Farm right on the banks of the river, you can see how the oysters are brought in from the 'beds' on 'trays' before being harvested and shucked. Their lunch menu features Birds Bay oysters Kilpatrick, mornay and *au naturale*, as well as live mudcrabs and spanner crabs caught by local fishermen who also supply Lee and Robert's very popular Catch-a-Crab cruises.

They also showcase the freshwater Akoya pearls which are also grown here in small quantities with a small gift shop featuring locally-designed Akoya pearl jewellery.

TROPICAL TREATS

Celebrating its 25th birthday in 2008, Tropical Fruit World and Research Park would have to be the world's healthiest theme park - comprising the largest range of rare and tropical fruit in the world. More than 500 varieties are grown on the 65-hectare plantation, with some of the more quirky varieties including chocolate pudding fruit, lemon meringue pie fruit, chewing gum fruit, champagne fruit and ice-cream bean. It's also a great place to introduce kids to tasty exotics such as jak fruit, babacos, papayas, longans and the giant avocados.

Owner Bob Brinsmead bought the property in 1972, gradually planting out the rolling hills with varieties gathered from all over the world. Prior to this, part of the land was used as by the Department of Agriculture as a research station, where their experimental plot included avocados, lychees, mangoes and macadamia nuts long before most Australians had even heard of these 'new' fruits. It was, in fact, the first place in NSW to grow and market avocados.

Opening to the public in 1973 as Avocadoland, Tropical Fruit World has evolved over the years as a popular family fun park with riverboat cruise, miniature railway, adventure playground and fauna park.

Behind the scenes, a team of horticulturalists conduct significant research, developing methods to optimise the growth of tropical and exotic fruits that are not native to the region. They are also developing advanced cultivation methods for some of the Asian fruits which are now appearing in Australian supermarkets, such as durian and dragon fruit, as well as supplying commercially to local restaurants.

DRIVE-BY SEAFOOD BANQUET

Following the 'food trail' is a great way to get out and explore the countryside. In Tweed Heads, however, you can put an ice-filled esky in the boot and stock up on a seafood banquet:

- Get off to an early morning start and meet the prawn trawlers at the Tweed marina where you can buy fresh off the back of the boat;
- Drive along the riverbank to Birds Bay and hop on the Catch-a-Crab cruise. The boat stops at sandbars and everyone gets off to go pumping for yabbies. Further along the river, you pull in the pots for a haul of mudcrabs and then throw a line off the side to catch a few silver bream;
- Driving back towards Tweed Heads, you can buy fresh oysters from one of the co-ops whose harvest comes from the oyster beds in the river;
- Back at Tweed Marina, you can hire out a luxury pontoon and set off to find a deserted river beach where you can barbeque the day's catch on board.

TASTE THE TWEED

In the past decade or so, a number of the traditional banana plantations and dairy farms of the Tweed Valley have been converted to niche produce and native bush tucker, much of which is unique to the region. Through Tweed Tourism's Taste the Tweed project, these growers are being encouraged to set up farmgate operations where visitors can learn more about these different fruits and flavours. - Soul Chocolates – The Sunday afternoon treat at Flutterbies Café in Tyalgum village is “Liquid Gold” – a warming winter beverage made from pure hand-made chocolate. It is made by a lovely local lady who also makes awesome chocolate truffles and gluten-free, wheat-free, everything-except-the-calories-free chocolate cookies.
- New Govardhana Hare Krishna Farm – This is one of only three Hare Krishna Farms in Australia where they grow much of the produce for the Hare Krishna restaurants in the cities. They welcome visitors and, on a Sunday evening from 6pm, put on a massive vegetarian community banquet which sometimes attracts up to 200 people. All they charge for this is a gold coin donation. The guy who originally bought this property 30 years ago and set it up as a Hare Krishna community is living here again after 15 years away and would be another good on-air talent.
- Gelateria Vernazza – The Italian owners of this tiny ice-cream shop in Salt Village moved here from the Cinque Terra village of Vernazza – and brought their authentic family gelati recipe with them. People have been known to drive down from the Gold Coast just to get one of their ice-creams.

The locations above are positioned along a loop drive starting at Salt Village and going right out through the Valley via some stunning ancient volcanic landscapes. The drive could therefore finish at one of a number of contemporary fine dining restaurants in Salt Village where our top chefs are developing a new brand of ‘Tweed cuisine’ by incorporating many of the local flavours sampled along the route.

TOURING / DRIVE ROUTES

NEW TOURING ROUTE: THE RAINFOREST WAY

The Rainforest Way is a new series of scenic driving routes connecting the 14 World Heritage-listed National Parks of northern NSW and southeast Queensland. Two of the most spectacular loops in the series focus on the Tweed region:

Tweed Range Scenic Drive – 90km / 4 hours driving

Via Murwillumbah to Lillian Rock – Mebbin National Park – Border Ranges National Park – Wiangaree – Kyogle

This loop takes you out along the western rim of the Tweed Caldera with spectacular views across the largest shield volcano in the southern hemisphere to the central core of Mt Warning. Filming opportunities and activities along this route include:

- Antarctic Beech forests near Bar Mountain Picnic Area in Mebbin NP
- Caldera and Mt Warning views from Blackbutts Picnic Area in Mebbin NP
- The Pinnacle Lookout – a narrow finger of land 919m high (easily reached via a short walk through lichen-covered rainforest) in Border Ranges NP
- Bushwalking tracks through palm forests and red cedars in Border Ranges NP
- Camping at Sheepstation Creek or Forest Tops in Border Ranges NP
- Village life in Wiangaree and Kyogle

Mt Warning View Circuit – 95km / 4 hours driving

Murwillumbah – Uki – Byrill Creek – Tyalgum – Chillingham

This loop circumnavigates Mt Warning, offering a cross-section of rainforest scenery, caldera mountain views and villages. Filming opportunities and activities along this route include:

- World Heritage Rainforest Centre at Murwillumbah where you can highlight the area's geographical history using the excellent visual displays here
- Murwillumbah's historic main street, al fresco cafes and the Tweed River Regional Art Museum which recently won a Northern NSW architectural award
- Mt Warning bushwalk through palm forests along the 200m Lyrebird Track (a much easier option than the summit climb)
- Uki – a quaint art and craft village on the Tweed River banks. The old Butter Factory here has been converted into artist studios, workshops and galleries
- 450m bushwalk through a stand of giant figs at Cutters Camp in Mebbin NP
- Tyalgum Village – quaint café and gift shop; town hall hosts a major classical music festival in September
- Chillingham Village – bush tucker farm growing exotic and native fruits; roadside fruit and veg stall where you can try 'yowie droppings' (dried bananas!); old Butcher Shop Art Gallery, soap factory, etc.

Nestled in the caldera of an ancient shield volcano, the Tweed region offers a unique combination of World Heritage listed rainforests, lush rolling farmland and unspoilt beaches – all within a relatively compact area.

In fact, you can see the whole package in one long sweeping glance from the summit of Mt Warning which rises 1156m from the valley floor.

In the early morning hours, you can watch the first rays of sunlight wash over 35kms of golden sands, touching on the quiet seaside holiday villages and the new international resorts. The Tweed and Oxley Rivers glisten as the warmth spreads out across emerald green dairy farms and tea plantations reaching towards the bustling centre of Murwillumbah and up the valley to the rainforest-shrouded cliffs that form the volcanic rim.

Within this Eden-like landscape, a wealth of holiday experiences await: Lazy days spent fishing from the riverbank or beach; relaxing river cruises or adrenalin-pumping off-shore fishing charters; slow and easy drives through quaint country villages, stocking up at farmers' markets and browsing local art and craft co-ops; hiking in the rainforest; long walks by the sea; leisurely lunches at cosmopolitan beachfront cafes; lively dinners at a country pub.

TWEED REGIONS

The Tweed is roughly divided into three regions, each with its own distinctive character:

Tweed Heads

Safe, patrolled swimming beaches are lined with first class resort hotels and apartment accommodation, and a vibrant retail precinct offers boutique shopping, sun-drenched cafes and plenty of family entertainment.

Tweed Coast

Stretching from Fingal Head at the southern mouth of the Tweed River to the untamed beauty of Wooyung Beach, the Tweed Coast offers a choice of quiet seaside villages and sophisticated resorts.

Kingscliff has emerged as a popular dining destination with a string of restaurants and cafes lining the beachfront esplanade.
